#### ■ What was it about *The Host* that got you on board?

Stephanie had an awful lot to do with me taking on the film. She was in London working on another film and came over to Dublin to see me to talk to me about the script and to see if I would be interested. I just found the whole concept of a body being taken over by an alien soul to rid us of all of the bad in us quite fascinating. I knew that it was going to be something I could really sink my teeth into.

## ■ Is it beneficial to read the books for more insight into your character?

I read the book and I am glad I did, because I was genuinely interested in finding how my character developed and where the story was going to go and if in fact I could

offer any suggestions once it came to taking on the role.

#### You play Melanie and also Wanda, the alien soul that inhabits her body.

It was fun playing both of these characters. There is an inner conflict going on between them, so to tackle the dialogue between Melanie and Wanda I wore an earpiece. Initially I thought it would be weird because we pre-recorded all the dialogue that Melanie hears in her head throughout the film. I actually got used to hearing myself and was able to react to it quite easily. It was still challenging but there weren't as many hurdles to jump over as I initially thought there might be.

## ■ Do you think that might be because the characters are so different?

Oh yes, absolutely. One is an alien

and she's sort of a perfect being. She doesn't feel any negative emotion at all, no hatred and doesn't flare up at all. Melanie is quite a spitfire. She's mouthy and she challenges people and she steals things and is always on the run. So it was quite fun getting to play two such opposite characters and it wasn't difficult separating them.

### ■ Was it hard to sympathize with Wanda?

No, it wasn't at all. She has

taken over Melanie's body but she doesn't know any better. Generally souls are beautiful creatures that make the world, in their eyes, a better place. I really loved her and couldn't blame her for anything that happened.

#### ■ Did you get to do your own stunts?

Yes, I insisted on doing as much as I could myself. Also, when you are able to do your own stunts and it's not life threatening, it's so much better because it means the camera can actually stay on you and you don't have to cut away to a stunt person. It looks so much more realistic and I have to say not only is it satisfying but it's pretty exhilarating!

## ■ Because you're playing two girls, you get two different love interests.

I know, right? We were calling it a love square on set. Firstly, Max Irons was just lovely to work with. We got on really well and we actually knew each other before we

Also, I'm Irish, I live in Ireland and I'm not the kind of person who gets excited about fame or that side of it; I just love doing what I do. I don't want to get a big head or carried away with all that sort of stuff. I just love to work and I feel so incredibly blessed that I get to meet so many new people who have enriched my life in ways I could never explain.

# ABIGAIL BRESLIN

describes being kidnapped in *The Call*

ABIGAIL BRESLIN may be only 16 but she's been working since age three, first in commercials and then making her movie debut as Mel Gibson's daughter in Signs (2002). She was nominated for an Oscar at 10 for her performance in Little Miss Sunshine. Three years ago, she made her Broadway debut playing Helen Keller in The Miracle Worker.

#### ■ Kidnapping has to be one of the scariest premises.

Yeah, it is. When I first read the script before I met with [director] Brad Anderson, it was such a page turner and my heart was pounding. I couldn't put it down and my initial feeling was if this gets made into a movie, it will be a pretty crazy ride to see on the big screen.

#### ■ What can you tell us about the movie?

I play Casey, a teenage girl who's at the mall with her best friend and she gets kidnapped in the parking lot and is put into the trunk of this guy's car. She wakes up completely disoriented and has no idea where she is. She finds her friend's prepaid cell phone in her pocket and dials 911. The first operator who answers is a trainee and doesn't know what to do because the phone has no GPS and you can't track where the call is coming from. That's when Halle Berry's character steps in. She's a former 911 operator who is now training people and takes over the call.

#### ■ How did you manage to stay calm being in that trunk?

They said we're going to put you in and we're going to be driving for about two minutes and then we will stop and let you out. I don't have claustrophobia so I wasn't worried about it. But when they closed the trunk, it was scary. It was pitch

black and I couldn't see anything. It totally throws you off and it is terrifying. The other thing was, I started thinking about all the things that could possibly go wrong, like what if I suffocate? What if they forget I'm in here?

#### Did you get to spend much time with Halle Berry?

No, Halle and I are barely in the same scenes together other than just being on the phone. They had it set up when I was in the trunk so I could listen to Halle talking. She would talk to me through a microphone so it was as if we really were communicating back and forth with each other. She was very sweet and so amazing to work with.

## You have several movies coming up, but one big one is *Ender's Game*.

It was really fun working on that movie. I loved working with Asa Butterfield. It's fun to meet people and when they ask, "What have you been working on?" and when I say *Ender's Game*, they freak out. A lot of people love my character Valentine and they say, "I wish I had a sister like her." She's a much-loved character from the book so I hope that I did her justice to the fans out there.
